USDA Biotech Tour and DVS Networking Social on Nov. 13th

id you know that the U.S. Department of Agriculture has a cutting edge research center right here in suburban Philadelphia? Located in the Wyndmoor-Glenside area, the Eastern Regional Research Center is part of the USDA's Agricultural Research Service. The center was recognized in 2007 as a National Historic Chemical Landmark and was visited this summer by USDA Secretary Tom Vilsack.

Now, the AIChE Delaware Valley Section has been invited for a rare tour of this renowned research center on Friday, November 13. The scientists and engineers at the facility perform pioneering research in sustainable bioenergy, food safety, and health-promoting foods. We'll focus on their biotechnology research and will see the center's pilot plants and fermentation lab. Tour topics include: Supercritical CO2 Pasteurization; Fast Pyrolysis of Biomass; Innovations in Dairy Research; Biodiesel from Natural Oil; and Fermentation.

After the tour, we'll meet up at Brittingham's Irish Pub & Restaurant in nearby Lafayette Hill for an AlChE-DVS happyhour and networking social, including a buffet dinner. The tour starts at 3 p.m., followed by social and dinner. Even if you can't make the tour, why not join us after work for food, drink, and socializing?



Speed to Market or Speed Kills

lmost every project I have worked on has been behind schedule from day one. The corporation has developed a new product that needs to get to market before the competition's product. A customer wants more product then current capacity allows, therefore process improvements need to be developed and implemented in a hurry. An existing processing unit exposes products to the realistic possibility of being contaminated. These are just some of the scenarios that can provide an impetus to complete a highly technical project in a hurry. But is a rush to get a new plant or process in place truly an advantage or is it a curse. Does speed to market help or does this speed kill?

Every project needs momentum to carry it from conception through to successful completion. But how much momentum? When should one press hard on the project gas pedal and when does one need to ease off the gas pedal of the project machine?

Every project starts with excitement about a new idea; a desired improvement, a new manufacturing approach, a cost saving measure, and a concept for implementing it. Usually the idea is unique and crude like newly mined ore. The idea needs to be processed to refine it into a workable concept for a new process, system or manufacturing plant. But, once the idea is refined into its final form it must be turned into tangible assets that perform as desired. Refining the original idea into a successful workable solution can take a significant amount of time. Additionally, turning the workable solution into tangible assets that perform as desired usually take a long period of time. If either of these project steps are done too fast; without considering all needs and ramifications, then a project may be destined to severe troubles or even failure down the road. These activities must be kept moving at a good pace in order to keep excitement and momentum on your side, but they can't be rushed through without mentally evaluating the pluses and minuses of various approaches and choices.

Once a sound concept of tangible assets is developed it is now time to do the hard work of defining all of the details necessary to bring the tangible assets to life. The characteristics of the process equipment must be defined. The necessary support utilities and facility must be defined. The required flow rates, temperatures, pressures and other process parameters must be worked out. Further, the way the process and equipment will operate and proceed will need to be defined and codified. The operating approach and sequences will then need to be turned into control algorithms and Standard Operating Procedures. But wait a minute. Are we going too fast? What about the safety considerations and controls that will need to be enacted? What about the environmental concerns that need to be identified, resolved and registered with the proper authorities? Are we still going too fast? Do we need to take the foot off of the gas pedal or are we seeing and avoiding these obstacles as we are travelling down the project highway? Again, we need to maintain momentum to get to the end of this road because of cost and schedule demands, but at what point does the rush to the finish start damaging the vehicle that is transporting us. At what point does the rush to speed imperil the product at the end of our planned journey? Are we going to get to our destination and find that we didn't account for a means to accomplish a vital activity?

For me the bottom line is pay me now or play me later. If adequate time isn't spent along the project highway to properly evaluate all short term and long term issues then the project may get detoured off the straight and narrow way (if there is such a thing in the complex and dynamic world we live in) or even driven over an embankment to a premature demise. So, the next time you are involved in a project, monitor the speed of your implementation schedule. Time certainly does mean money, but rushing things can cost you even more, it may cost you large sums of money at the end of the project to correct earlier oversights. It may also cost you satisfaction with the final operability of the installed assets and/or the quality of the project's intended aims.
